

Your representations have turned my mind to this subject; and it appears to me, that, our Great Master having given a considerable degree of strength to the capacities of the Church in your quarter to support our designs toward New Zealand, we are specially called on to cultivate that promising field.

I have put up some recent pamphlets &c. for your use, and that of the settlers. Mr Kendall took out some books with him as the foundation of a Missionary Library. I now send the Annual Register for 1812, and 1813, to be added thereto; and would have had them bound if time would have allowed.

If you could procure at a reasonable price a complete sett of the Sydney Gazettes, we should much wish to have them for the Society's library here; and also to have them regularly purchased for us, and sent home. Copies, too, of any other periodical work which may now or hereafter appear in the Colony, would be very desirable.

Your letter of August 11th 1813, is arrived. It greatly confirmed our hopes respecting New Zealand. The conduct of William Hall bespeaks both a want of zeal for the honour of his Master among the Heathen, and a want of faith in him that He will provide for him while engaged in His work.
