

period as partly the cause of the Letter complained of having been inserted in the Sydney Gazette; to this I reply that the letter signed "Philo Free" was not of that urgent importance to compel the Editor to insert it in that days paper. I conceive it very improbable that so long a letter and of such tendency could be admitted in the Sydney Gazette without exciting the attention of Mr Leef Campbell and receiving his entire sanction; Mr Leef Campbell also observes that he felt a degree of satisfaction by the removal in the letter signed "Philo Free" of the Philanthropic Society question; no Member of that Society could possess more ample means of information relative to its concerns than himself.

He a Member of the Committee, His Excellency the Governor Patron, His Honor the Lt Gov Resident, Deputy Commissioner General Allan Treasurer, the Committee for accounts and the Collector W Jenkins, all reside at Sydney from these sources alone his enquires might have been fully satisfied at any time on the spot, without any reference to me whatever as Secretary to the Society residing at Parramatta; having made the above remarks I beg leave to notice the latter part of your official communication in which you acquaint me with the Grounds upon which you at present do not conceive that you would be warranted in preferring a public indictment in your own name and character against the Printer of the Sydney Gazette; I believe criminal informations are sometimes filed against Libellers Ex Officio by the Attorney General without any Affidavit and I conceive in cases attended with less aggravated circumstances than the present of which I complain, it is not uncommon for the Court of Kings Bench to grant an information on the simple Affidavit of the party aggrieved; I also humbly conceive that some consideration is due to my rank as Principal Chaplain of this colony
