He will create difficulties where there are none, and where they are, he will magnify them an hundredfold. Perhaps the Society will think my letter to Mr. Hall too strong and that I ought to have supported him a little. But I assure you nothing short of such a strong Remonstrance, would have had any effect upon his mind. I had tried in vain the Power of words: and told him I would represent his Conduct to the Society again and again. Should Messrs. Hall & King have complained of my Conduct towards them, the Society will be convinced from those Facts stated in my letter to Mr. Hall, that they had no just Ground of Complaint. They would have taken the Society's money, and yet would not merit it by their Services - and to this I would not consent. I believe they are both now fully sensible of their Error, and will not act so in future - we have had no Difference upon any other Point, but this -
