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Memorandum. November 15. 1814 Embarked on board the Activo with my wife and three sons Thomas, Basil and Joseph for New Zealand.

Philip Stoddard who was recommended to me by six Clergymen at Bristol, being desirous to continue with me, was permitted by Governor Manguaric to leave the Colony for a limited period.

His services were very acceptable to Mr Kendall during my absence in the last voyage of the Activo to Van Diemens Land and New Zealand, and should it please God to bless me in establishing a school at Teppooa he will be very useful to me. I pay him a salary of ten pounds per annum for clothing &c

Mr Marden, Mr Nicholas & My colleagues Messrs Hales & King with Mrs Hales and Mrs King and one child each, also the Chiefs Honghee, Hunohono and Quatero, and the natives Tenana, Toi, Mowee, Mahou, Miti, Deporo and Marhabhee were our companions.

Mahou died two days before our arrival in the Bay of a Dysentery. Dec: 19th The vessel came to an anchor near to an Island belonging to Mahou the sister of Honghee. Here I saw the two Brothers, Teana and Teppoohee with a large party of men from Wangarooa who assisted in the destruction of the Boyde. They all conducted themselves towards us in a very friendly manner.

Dec: 22nd we arrived at Teppooa and Janry 10. 1815

I removed from the Activo with my family.

Memorandum. Mr. Marden has had an opportunity to observe a great deal of Superstition during the illness of Quatero which he will notice in his communications I am in haste
