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replied "he would never make another attempt
to take a vessel.

I have in my last letter to Mr Woodd written
home for assistance. A person of talent to assist
in writing down the language, a Blacksmith and
a Schoolmaster would be of great service at
New Zealand. You mention the probability of
sending out some Lutheran Clergy. In the selection
of Missionaries you will no doubt be governed by
circumstances, but if a Clergyman of my own
Country could be prevailed upon to come, we could
better cooperate in fixing the native language,
as we should better agree in method and arrangement
of letters than two persons who had been accustomed
to speak different languages. The Committee I
hope will impress it upon the minds of those
they send, that they can not enter in to private
Trade while they are on the Society's Settlement.
Every thing ought to belong to the Society. By
