Tippookee expressed a desire to go to Port Jackson in the future the last time he was here but I advised him to the contrary. I told him he must keep from ships. The friends of the unfortunate people who were murdered in the Bayde were very angry. He had done a very bad thing. He replied "he would never make another attempt to take a vessel."
