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The Society, that the Civilization and general improvement of the New Zealanders would be greatly promoted by forming a small Establishment in this Colony for their instruction in some of the simple arts, such as spinning and Weaving their Native Flax; Manufacturing it into Twine and Cordage, and in Blacksmiths work and Agriculture. - Such an Establishment independent of promoting the Civilization of the New Zealanders would afford a certain pledge for the safety of the Settlers at New Zealand, as the Natives who would be instructed under the patronage of this Institution would either be the Sons of Chiefs or their near Relations, and would also accommodate such Chiefs as may from time to time visit Port Jackson in the Active where they would be kindly treated and protected from insult during the time the Vessel remains in the Harbour, which will tend to enlarge their Ideas, remove their prejudices, & excite in them a thirst for useful knowledge. The annual expence of such an Establishment at present for the hire of the necessary Buildings, Tools, Overseers wages, the support of the Natives and other conveniences, we estimate at £200 p. Ann.

Under these impressions we have resolved to form the Establishment immediately on the Society's
