My Dear Sir

I have various letters of yours before me - (1) To Mr. Wood, of Feb. 13/15 - (2) To Mr. Marsden, of July 6/15 (3) Rough copy of papers - (4) to me, of Jan. 19. to Jan. 29/15.

Many of your statements are very interesting to the Committee; but they are much grieved to learn, by your letters and those of Mr. Hall and Mr. King, sent by Cap^t. Graham, of the Natharine, that you have not been at peace among yourselves. The great enemy has succeeded in his malicious designs, and, unless God, of His infinite mercy, bring those who have been wrong, to repentance and a right mind, His work will be delayed and hindered by the want of Faith and Obedience in those who have taken it in hand. It is impossible for the Committee, at this distance, to understand your affairs so as to give decisive opinions upon them. A Com^m is now appointed at Port Jackson. The whole management of the Mission is entrusted to them. Whatever articles of supply any of the settlers want, shall be sent to them. The Com^m will send us any Indent of all such supplies, and of whatever they wish to have sent out for carrying on the Society's designs.

You will transmit to that Com^m. full and regular reports of the Settlements, and they will transmit them home to us.

On the subject of private Trade the Committee do very strongly enjoin the most implicit regard to the regulations of Mr. Marsden and his co-agitators of the
