

Paper, I conceive it very improbable that so long a

 Grounds upon which you at present do not conceive
 that you would be warranted in preferring a public
 indictment in your own name and Character against
 the printer of the Sydney Gazette; I believe criminal
 informations are sometimes filed against Libellers
Ex Officio by the Attorney General without any Affidavit
 and I conceive in cases attended with less aggravated
 circumstances than the present of which I complain, it
 is not uncommon for the Court of Kings Bench to
 grant an information on the simple Affidavit of the
 party aggrieved; I also humbly conceive that some
 consideration is due to my rank as Principal Chaplain
 of this Colony and Minister of the Established Church
 here 24 Years and Magistrate, so far at least as to
 entitle me to the same indulgence which is usually
 granted in similar cases to a British subject; however
