

which he is justly entitled in a Missionary
Settlement, there will be no such thing as peace
amongst us for any length of time, and the
situation will be peculiarly painful for a
Schoolmaster or a Clergyman. I know there
is a plea of aiming at independance urged in
favor of private commerce, but I am certain there
can be no such thing as independance at New
Zealand for an Englishman, without an English
Force for the protection of property, and if private
commerce can not be carried on without opposing
Missionary Settles and defeating the object of a
Missionary Society it ought to be relinquished.
It is easy to point out a remedy for the
evil just represented. I wish it to be put
in practice, not only as a check upon others
but as one upon myself. We perfectly agree
in rationing out all supplies which we receive
from Mr Marsden; We only want to agree in this.
