gain opportunity of pleasing the Society and of becoming most nobly popular; and if, ^{he} chooses to build a chapel and disinterestedly to promote the designs of the Society he may become so still. But if he only intends so far to perform his duty as is consistent with his own private interests, if he only means to make himself independent of the Society, by buying up all that he can in the Settlement and selling it to shipping for the attainment of this object, ^(a) he must be opposed. It is not long since that I attempted to follow him, but I soon found the impropriety of it. We might pursue temporal objects while the main objects of the Society were entirely laid aside. Besides every Missionary that comes here, shares in equal duties and dangers, and has an undoubted right to an equal share of the necessaries of life. I have nothing to say against Mr. Wall's Moral Character. He has also been very ready to sharpen my plain views, and has done me several other favours for which I am thankful, but we have always differed in our opinions and seem to be a stumbling block in each other's way; I will not if I can help it, come near him to quarrel with him
