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to you the difficulties under which the Settlers in general labour, through private trade being disposed of to the Natives, & the consequent unpleasant circumstances attending the unequal distribution of the necessaries of life. It would be very encouraging to us if something was arranged on this head, as none of us can conveniently spare any thing out of our yearly allowance."

In the same Letter a wish is expressed, dearestly urged, that a separate allowance may be made for the support of the school, as the Scholars were daily leaving for want of food.

The Committee beg you & your Colleagues to make such arrangements, in both these respects, as shall seem most effective. They will gladly support your plans on both heads.

A Native is come to England in the Catherine, whom Captain Graham will take back with him. While he stays we shall do all that we can for him.

The Claudine is not yet arrived.

May our gracious God strengthen you for all your labours, & abundantly bless you in them!
