

191 On Sunday the 24th. To day the wind was more favorable but we could not get out one or two ships that were lying with us in the downs made sail but first to come back we had no Publick Service on deck. our little party assembled together in Mr Hall's Cabin and Mr Butler read the Prayers: and in the evening read a Sermon the Text was - Be ye also ready I enjoyed grate comfort in the meeting

On the 25th. The wind changed and went into the old quarter again on the 26th. we had a Pilot come on Board from Deal to take us as fair as Portsmouth: to day the Ship drew her Anchor the Wind Blowing very Sharp

On the 26th. The wind much the same as the day past employed in school with Mr Hall and the two natives

And on the 27th. We did Anchor at 7 o'clock in the Morning to proceed down the Channal with a South East wind at the rate of 6 knots an hour employed in writing letters to send by the Pilot

On the 28th. The Pilot left us at 4 o'clock of Portsmouth the wind quite fair for us in the morning the wind arose and Blew very Sharp we felt our souls softer in the Arms of the Blessed Saviour

On the 29th. To day the wind abated it was not so fair for us in the evening it Blew fresh again employed in school

And on the 30th. To Day the wind is much the same employed as usual in school

On Sunday the 31st. The wind quite fair for us sailing about 7 knots No Publick Service on Deck to day Mr Hall and myself went among the convicts and gave them about 300 Tracts we humbly pray that the Lord may give a Blessing to them we had Service twice in the Day in Mr Hall's Cabin I trust it was a gracious opportunity to my soul and I trust to all present
