

On the 17<sup>th</sup>. At anchor the ship in great confusion in taking  
in fresh Provisions not able to have any School I wish to see  
very desirous in seeing their friends that they know living in  
this Town

And on the 18<sup>th</sup>. This afternoon we received an invitation  
to wait on the governor - we received some refreshment and  
returned on board in the evening

On the 19<sup>th</sup>. The night past Mrs Kemp was taken very  
poorly having caught a sad cold and was very sick all  
this day - I humbly pray that his grace may abound in her  
soul to support her in her afflictions

Sunday the 20<sup>th</sup>. At anchor No service on Deck We had service  
in Mr Hall's cabin once in the Day - Mrs Kemp very poorly  
My soul is dejected and cast down but what saith the blessed  
Jesus in the world ye shall have tribulation but be of good  
cheer I have overcome the world

And on the 21<sup>st</sup>. Weid anchor about 11 o'clock this morning to proceed  
to Sidney the wind foul in the evening it blew a very sharp  
gale of wind - Mrs Kemp very poorly in the night with  
sickness I trust I can say with David the Lord is my refuge  
I will not fear

On the 22<sup>nd</sup>. The wind blowing very rough  
and quite against us in the afternoon the wind came  
fair for us - in the evening the ship Daphne Capt<sup>r</sup> Howard  
came in sight from Sidney bound to Hobart Town - Mrs Kemp  
Better Not able to attend School to day

And on the 23<sup>rd</sup>. Sailing with a fresh Breeze and quite fair  
Mrs Kemp much better employed in School

On the 24<sup>th</sup>. The wind blowing very rough all the day, and we  
sailing before the wind - employed in School as usual I trust  
I can say with the Prophet Isaiah O Lord thou art my  
god I will exalt thee I will praise thy Name for thou  
hast done wonderful things

On the 25<sup>th</sup>. Sailing much the same as the Day past  
Early this morning land in sight the coast of New Holland  
employed in getting our things ready to go on shore

And on the 26<sup>th</sup>. Early this morning we came in sight  
of Sidney much desired by all and through his great  
mercy we are all brought in safely into this Port after  
a 5 months passage <sup>from</sup> England. We cast anchor about noon

in Sidney harbor Mr Butler & Mr Hall and the two Notaries  
went on shore to send a letter up to Mr Marsden to state our safe arrival  
as soon as possible. In the mean time Mr Eager a friend of  
Mr Marsden's came and very gladly received us giving his love  
The Lord will reward him for all his kindness shewn to us
