A M. Jesus who ordaineth all things both in Heaven and earth has been pleased to answer our prayers. The troubled elements are at rest. Fine pleasure w^o. employed as before - P. M. D. W. Dearest Lord if those be any of our party that have embarked themselves for New Zealand whose hearts are not right with Thee be pleased in Thine own way to put them on Shore again and let the Ship sail.

Wednesday 27 Jan^y 1819

A M. Thanks be to God the wind is shifted to the S. E. at 7 weighed anchor and made sail as did the Lyffer Frigate & several Indiamen. P. M. Sailing down Channel with a fine Top Gallant breeze and Studding sails set. The Lord Jesus be pleased to blow a sweet breeze of Grace into our souls and suborn us and carry us in safety where we are going.

Thursday 28 Jan^y

A M. At 3 o'clock saw the ocean lights. Haled a boat which took our pilot on Shore & an Lobster - a fine breeze from the Southward. Emp^d. with Tooi & Teetooce and in reading Gods Holy word. O that I could read the sacred pages of eternal truth to more prof^r. Blesed Spirit proceeding from the Father and the Son enable me to do so.

Friday Jan^y 29

A M. A very tempestuous night the ship more agitated than she has been since we have been at board. Some of our party again sickly we are abreast of the Lizard - Calm weather with rain at times. W. Kemp and myself employed as before. P. M. D. W. and employment - Brother Kemp and myself went upon the poop in the Evening to take perhaps a last look at England. We are off the Lizard end - Farewell England may the richest blessings of the most High be poured down upon Thee.

Saturday Jan^y 30

A M. Light breezes and fine weather wind northerly have lost sight of England and are pleasantly proceeding on our Voyage. W. Kemp & myself endeavouring to instruct Tooi & Teetooce from day to day - it is nearly painful to see how reluctantly they come to their studies. The Lord give us patience and wisdom to deal with them, and to do them good. P. M. a fine breeze from the Eastward we are sailing at the rate of 7 knots of hour.

Sunday Jan^y 31

A M. We are agreeably proceeding on our Voyage with the wind right aft and fine mild weather - W. Kemp and myself went amongst the prisoners and delivered tracts to them and prayed to the Lord to bless the work of our hands - Mr. Butler read prayer in our Cabin when Mr. Roberts the Commodore attended and Mr. Turnbull and his three children - P. M. Mr. & Mrs. Kemp Tooi & Teetooce assembled in the Afternoon and read for our improvement In the Evening Mr. Roberts & Mr. Turnbull & Mr. & Mrs. Kemp attended Divine Service. The Cabin was nearly full. Pour out Thy Spirit upon us Blesed Spirit and mercies are ^{sent: 17. 28} _{at Number}
