It is impossible for me to
express my joy on the arrival of the Rev.
Wm. Butler &c. at Parramatta; they are
literally come to the help of the Lord against
the mighty. I beg to return the Society my
most grateful Acknowledgements for this
Special Token of their Care for the mission,
which far exceeds all that I looked for. I hope
now the Bitterness of Death is past. It has
been a source of painful Regret to me, to
be compelled to trouble the Society as I have
done with my Complaints. I hope now the
Storm is broken. God hath in his kind Providence
"stilled the Enemy and the Avenger." If I could
possibly have stood my ground here, without ever
appeal to the Laws of my Country; I should not
have appeared at the Bar of Justice but before
now would I afterwards have troubled my Friends
in England, if I had not been convinced that ruin
but ruin would attend me and my Family both
in this Colony, and in England. Here the Enemy
is potent all the Power, and his notice was equal
to his Power - I had no Access to the Authorities
at Home, as an individual; I could not expect
that any Representations I could make would have
