Society to appeal to. There was no necessity to throw
me into the hands of the Enemy for the sake of a
few pounds, and which I have not benefited by.
I spend my time in looking after the concerns of the
Society, in providing for your wants. I travel at
my own Expence; and have all the Anxiety, and
responsibility of the mission upon me as far as it
can be laid upon me. This is enough, without any
criminal Charges made against me, by any of
the Missionaries as they have the Society to appeal
to, to redress their wrongs. I have only to request,
that you will state your Complaints to me, and
leave the Society to judge how far I have injured you
as individuals; and give me an opportunity to reply
to your Charges if you have any to make, and
you will much oblige.
