not serve the Society on the terms he was then upon.

of them - In my opinion I thought they were amply
supplied; but as they did not think so, I recom-
-mended them to write to the Society and to inform
the Society what their wishes were - I was much
astonished when I learned that the Rev. Mr. Butler &
Kendall had drawn for a sum upon the Society
before their salaries were due - I told Mr. Butler
their bills would not be paid - If Mr. Butler & Kendall
had acted properly many evils w^d have been prevented.
Mr. Francis Hall will give you every information on
all the Affairs of the mission - I hope he will return
to the work - He is a pious good man, and loves the
Cause - His feelings have been severely wounded
by the conduct of some of his colleagues, and his
Spirits were broke - I hope I shall be able to go
over to N. Scotland when Mr. Williams goes - but I
am not certain - I wish to heal all breaches, and
to put the mission once more on a good
