

blessing to accomplish that desirable end. Nothing can be done of a general nature, untill the whole of the Missionaries with their families are comfortably lodged as soon as this is done there must in the next place be convenient lodges made for the scholars to be instructed in, and to eat in, and always in the store for their use a sufficient quantity of rice and potatoes. at first they might each of them be provided with two sorts of cloathing, the Lord's Day, and on particular occasions. It would be the wisest plan for each Missionary to begin with a few, say ten. Little Prayers them, untill a regular assortment of books could be written, and printed for their instruction.

The Native children in general particularly Chefs Sons, have been very wild and unsettled of late but some children would in my opinion attend.

And I have no doubt but the Lord would in time vouchsafe his blessing.
