

blessing to accomplish that desirable  
 end. Nothing can be done of a general  
 nature, until the whole of the Missionaries  
 with their families are comfortably lodged  
 As soon as this is done, there  
 must in the next place be con-  
 -veniences made for the scholars to  
 be instructed in, and to eat in, and  
 to lodge in. There must also be  
 always on the store for their use a  
 quantity of rice and potatoes. At  
 first they might each of them be  
 provided with two suits of cloathing,  
 and be permitted to wear them on  
 the Lords Day, and on particular  
 occasions. It would be the wisest  
 plan for each Missionary to begin  
 with a few, say ten. Little prayers  
 themes catechisms &c might be taught  
 them, until a regular assortment  
 of books could be written, and prin-  
 ted for their instruction.

The Native children in general  
 particularly Chiefs Sons, have been  
 very wild and unsettled of late  
 but some children would in  
 my opinion attend.

And I have no doubt but the  
 Lord would in time vouchsafe  
 his blessing.
