

subjected. by not being put on shore, while the ship lay at the Bay of Islands, within two miles of his home, and being subsequently prevented from leaving the vessel when off the North Cape: that it was a great addition to his misery, to be left, with his companions, in a destitute situation, on Norfolk Island, after all the assistance they had rendered him (the Master) in procuring his Cargo.

Nothing, however, which Duaterra could urge, had any effect on the callous mind of the Captain, who, proceeded on board his ship, and left the New Zealanders to provide for themselves as they best could. — Duaterra further stated that the Master came again on shore (before he left), and took Tippakee's son on board with him, by force, though the lad wept much and entreated the Captain to leave him with his friends, Duaterra — (No tidings have been heard of that young man since he was, thus, forcibly taken from Norfolk Island. — The ship was taken by an American, while on her passage home, after a severe action in which the Captain was mortally wounded, and the chief mate killed).

Some time after the Frederick had sailed from Norfolk Island, the 'Ann' whaler touched there for refreshments, she was then commanded by W. Gwynn, and after procuring supplies she was to proceed to Port Jackson. —

Duaterra made early application to the Master who very humanely granted him a passage, on
