

It may not be uninteresting to some of my readers, to subjoin also the Memoir of another Young Chief named 'Nowhee' who likewise was instrumental in promoting the introduction of the Gospel to Newzealand.

When Nowhee was about eight years old, he became desirous of visiting New South Wales, from the accounts he had heard of the Europeans, mentioned to him, by 'Roadoo', and 'Tokeri': and to effect his purpose, he embarked on board a whaler at the Bay of Islands (the Captain of which intending to call at Port Jackson) and on their way the vessel touched at Norfolk Island, when Mr. Drummond (the Harbour Master) went on board, and took Nowhee on shore to his own house, and treated him with great kindness: and promised to keep him as one of his own family, if he agreed to remain, — Mr. D. then placed him at a day school where he learned to read and write. —

Sometime after Nowhee's arrival in Norfolk Island, Mr. Drummond removed to New South Wales (taking the lad with him, and
