

and settled on a farm at Liverpool. (a town about seven miles south from Parramatta). I visited Mr. D. shortly after he had settled on his Estate, and found Mowhee living with him there, as a servant, or acting rather in the capacity of shepherd. - This sort of employment did not seem to suit Mowhee's turn of mind, - he wanted to be placed in a situation, where he could see and learn more of civil life. -

I proposed that he should come and live with me, to which Mr. D. agreed; and he was accordingly removed into my family. - By this time he had learned to speak English tolerably well, and could read a little. - He possessed an amiable disposition, and seemed anxious to learn all he could. -

He remained with me till November 1814; making the period of his stay with Mr. Drummond and me together, to be more than eight years. -

He accompanied me, when I sailed to Newzealand in the Active, and possessed, at that time as clear a knowledge of civil life, and of the Christian Religion, as human instructions, could well communicate, to one just emerging from savage life. -

On 23^d Dec^r. he arrived in the Bay of Islands to the great joy of his friends, and it gave me great pleasure to see with what kindness and
