

Missionary Society's House in Salisbury Square. His case and circumstances were laid before the Committee of that benevolent Institution; which immediately resolved to provide for the friendless stranger. —

He was taken under the protection of the Society until an opportunity should offer to return him to his native Land.

The Rev^d Basil Woodd got him under his more immediate care, and provided accommodation for him in a respectable family.

— He was sent to a charity school belonging to the 'Bentinch Chapel' and during his attendance on it, he was taken ill (on the 25th) and died on the 28th Dec^r 1816.

The Rev^d B. Woodd published a very interesting Memoir of him, in the Church Missionary Register for Feb^y 1817, to which I refer the reader.
