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to the knowledge of his sins, he convinced of his fallen nature, feel the need in which he stood of a Saviour, and with a penitent and believing heart, might understand the design of the death of the Lord Jesus Christ, and trust alone for pardon and acceptance to the Lamb of God who taketh away the sins of the world. —

I requested, also, that Mr. Amis one of the Masters of the Bentinck schools, and another friend, Mr. Short, would bring him with them to attend the worship of God at Bentinck Chapel, and see that he was present at the public Catechizing of the Schools, at the afternoon service. —

I felt the case of this young stranger from a far distant land peculiarly interesting. — It struck me as a golden opportunity, or rather as an opportunity more precious than Gold, not to be lost; that good was to be done to him now, or perhaps never; that, in a few months we must part to meet no more on earth; and therefore, that, it was an imperious duty, the dictate of Christian charity, to afford him in that compressed form which the shortness of his abode in this country demanded all the general knowledge possible. —
