 in their power, to please and gratify us. —
 After spending a few hours we returned
 to the place, where we left Mr. Kendall
 talking to the old man; a number of the
 natives attended us, and we enjoyed a very
 pleasant day; as every object around
 us was new and interesting, particularly
 the Inhabitants. From the top of the
 Cavalles, the view of the main land, together
 with the Ocean, and the numerous small
 Islands scattered upon it, is the most
 delightful I ever saw (at least I thought so)
 When we arrived we found Mr. Kendall had
 been visited by some of the natives, who
 were still with him, and had much entertained
 him during our absence. — In the evening
 we returned to the vessel, accompanied by
 the son of the chief and other chiefs from
 the main, who remained on board all
 night. — The next morning, the wind
 still continued against us, and we had
