

discovered Cape Brett in sight. - As we sailed along the coast, we were visited by ten Canoes, which brought us plenty of fish. - About 3 p. m. we anchored in the harbour of Raughachoo; and found all on the settlement well, and assuming the pleasing appearance of civilization from the buildings erected and erecting and from the Sawyers, Smiths, and others at work. -

Having now completed every thing relative to the Establishments of the Mission that appeared to me, necessary as far as regarded the intercourse of the settlers with the natives -

I had opened a communication nearly two hundred miles along the coast and the Chiefs in all the different districts were acquainted with the object in view; and they all seemed sensible of the benefits which they were likely to derive from the residence of Europeans among them. - A more promising prospect could not be looked for, than the present for civilizing this interesting people. - We had had no differences, during the whole time of our stay (and we had no means of protecting ourselves against such numbers, as are in these districts) but were wholly in the power of
