he would revenge the death of his Sister.

In 1815. Temmarangha accompanied me to Pauramatta; and two years after his return, he mustered his tribe and set off to the East-Cape, to perform the oath which he had sworn to his father. He killed the Chief of the Island where ^{when his Sister} had been murdered, and brought away the Chief's wife a prisoner, and gave her to his brother, to whom she now lives.

M^r Kendall informs me, that there is always some, either, remote or immediate, cause, that induces the Chiefs to go to war; and that it is not for the mere motive of plunder and blood, but to obtain satisfaction for some injury done to them or to their Tribe.

In the above canoe, I met with Horatookie, and his two brothers and uncle, who were all officers under Korokorro. Horatookie was the first New Zealander who was introduced into Civil Society. He had been landed at Norfolk I. with another of his countrymen about twenty five years ago, by some vessel which had touched at New Zealand. The late Governor King had the command of the Island at that time. He treated the two strangers with great kindness: they lived at his table and received from him every attention. After remaining a considerable time with the Governor, the Britannia whaler touched at Norfolk Island; when the Governor agreed with the Master to take Horatookie and his companions to New Zealand, and accompanied
