

of his servants: The Young Men, when they arrived, appeared alarmed: I spoke to Tooha, and told him what had taken place: he was much concerned for the death of his servants; but assured me that he should show no anger to the Young Men who had killed them, for he knew better than to do so now; which promise he strictly kept. These incidents will tend to show the superstition and character of these people.

In passing along the Village, we spoke to a man and his wife. There were some fowls running on the premises, which the man told me, had been bred from some that I had given. Teroa, the Head Chief on the south side of the Bay, when I was first there; and that when Teroa died, his wife had taken Teroa's Nephew for her Husband, who succeeded to the authority of his uncle. As it was contrary to the established custom of the Natives for a Chief's wife to marry again, a party from Rang-hoo went over to punish her for the violation of their laws, and stripped her of what property she possessed.
