He expressed his fears that Shunghee would be offended if I went to Shukcangha, lest any ship, at a future time, when the river and harbour were known, should come to them. I replied, that before he came to Pangheehoo, I had formed an intention of visiting them; and had already mentioned the circumstance to Shunghee, who approved of my design, and would not be displeased with me, or them, for my visiting the inhabitants on the banks of the Shukcangha. He expressed his satisfaction that Shunghee approved of my going; and said that he would supply the Settlement with pigs and potatoes, when formed at Slidee Tiddsee; as it would be nearer to Shukcangha. I gave him a spade; and promised his people some fish-hooks when I came to their Settlement, which pleased them all. Sept. 1, 1819 —
