When I first visited New Zealand, Terra wept much for joy; and both he and his wife shewed us the greatest kindness. Mr. Kendall informed me that he died last November; and expressed his happiness, on his dying bed, that no European had ever been killed in his district. We found his successor at home, who has long been known by the name of King George; and Terra's late wife, with several of their people. They were overjoyed to see us; and Terra's Widow requested me to sit down by her, which I did. She then told me what troubles she had met with, since I was there - that when Terra was alive, they had plenty of hoes, axes, spades, fish-hooks, tools, sweet and common potatoes, and fowls, from those I had given them, and clothing; but that now they were completely
