— Particulars —
of the ~~fifth~~^{sixth} Voyage of the
Rev: Saml. Marsden, to New
Zealand, in the year 1830.

Having obtained leave of absence
from His Excellency the Governor, I embarked,
on the 16th July 1830, on board the Elizabeth
for the Bay of Islands with one of my
daughters. We had no sooner cleared
the Heads of Port Jackson, than a heavy
gale set in from the Southward which
soon raised a high sea. I immediately
became very sick, and continued so the
following day, when the wind shifted to
the South East. From that time
we met with contrary winds, and a head
sea; with the exception of a few hours,
until Thursday the 28th, when we
saw land to the Southward of Cape
Maria Van Dieman, and on Friday
Morning we reached it, and sailed
close in with the land, until we passed
the Cape, on rounding which the wind
was
