

escaping in the whaleboat, fired and killed the daughter, while the mother got safe on board. Some of the whalers had loaded their guns, and were ready to fire upon the natives with canister shot, in case they should attack those natives who were on board, as the ships were within gun shot of the shore. Mr. Davis, one of the missionaries, was on board the Sovereign whose guns were in readiness, and intreated the captain not to use them unless absolute necessity should oblige him for the protection of the ship. The Masters of the whalers were very much agitated, and scarcely knew how to act. They all accused Capt. Bind as the author of the misery occasioned by this disturbance.

On Sunday Morning, the 7th, at the advice of an old Chief, Warereee,^{Waremi} - Hevi Hevi also left Hororauka and came over with his people to Paipica, the Missionary Station. Warereee was convinced that Hevi Hevi could not defend himself against Ouwaa, when he renewed his attack upon him. Hevi Hevi wished to fortify himself near the Missionary station. To this the missionaries could not consent, as it would ^{have} exposed them to too imminent danger. At length it was finally determined that Hevi Hevi
