When I felt any difficulty in making them understand these important doctrines I availed myself of Mr. Shepherd's interpretation. I said much to them upon the Resurrection of the dead; and that all their friends would rise again at the last day, and appear before that Saviour of whom I was speaking, and that those who feared and loved him now would then be received into his glorious Kingdom, and dwell with him for ever; whilst all the wicked would be condemned to dwell in everlasting fire. They were much unprepared with these subjects and appeared to understand them and as I had Mess^{rs} Shepherd and King with me, I was at no loss for an interpreter. I have no doubt but that God will take a people unto himself from amongst these poor Heathen, who shall see his salvation. — *omnipotent.*

Monday 5th. This day I left Rangiha, and crossed the Bay to Paipai. The Rev^d Mr. Williams had got the roof of his house completed on my return. In the Evening Mr. Williams provided a supper for the native carpenters eight in number. It was very pleasing to see them sitting down dressed in European clothing, clean, and orderly, to a good English plum pudding, which some probably had
