

96 determined to leave the schooner, and wait for 1820  
the return of the Tromedary. The Master  
laded the greatest part of his stores and sailed Sep  
again for Port Jackson - after refreshing  
myself for a few days at the Bay of Islands  
I went to Wangarua and joined the Tromedary  
again - Finding the Tromedary  
would not complete her cargo for 6 weeks  
I determined to visit the different Tribes  
of Inhabitants again on the east and west  
side of New Zealand and immediately pre-  
-pared for another Tour, as I thought I could  
not spend my time more to the advantage  
of the Mission than by paying another  
visit to the Tribes I had seen and to visit  
others I had not seen, with this view  
I once more left the Tromedary, where  
I had always received the kindest from  
Capt Skinner and all the Officers both  
Military and Naval and which I shall  
ever retain a grateful remembrance of  
On leaving the Tromedary I proceeded  
to Whiddee Whiddee where the Rev J Butler  
agreed to accompany me on my intended  
Tour -
