 I saw the state Mr Leigh was in I recommended him to
 return with me to Fort Jackson. He wanted more
 more comforts and Medical Advice - There were not to
 be procured in Bangarea - I felt much to
 Turner a young woman who would now be left without

any female companion but a young girl she had taken from
 Fort Jackson - Mrs Turner has one young child at the Boat

It was the opinion of Mr Leigh's colleagues as well as
 my own, that his weak state of Health required
 his speedy removal. The Rev^d White & Turner are both
 Young Men, they have a very trying situation as they
 must want experience. I hope they will do well and
 conduct themselves with Patience and Reverence.
