 so unwell from fatigue & want of rest that I
 declined going, with Mr Williams and he
 returned on Shore alone - after Mr Williams
 was gone several chiefs came on board - One
 named Iowa, the son of ^{late} the Chief Tappanee a very
 fine young Man who had resided with me at
 Pauramatta more than twelve months addressed
 me and said Mr Kendall had informed
 him that day that he was going ^{to leave} New Zealand
 and they wished to know if Mr Kendall had been
 dismissed as a Supernary for selling Muskets
 and Gun-powder to the New Zealanders So
 this I replied that Mr Kendall was directed
 by the Gentlemen in England who had sent him out as
Supernary not to sell Muskets & Powder that it was
^{not} the custom in England for Clergymen to sell Muskets
 and Powder, and that no Supernary could be
 allowed to sell them in New Zealand As several
 of the Chiefs who were present had been at Port Jackson I observed
 that the Clergymen there did not sell Muskets & Powder
