upon various subjects, and all prejudice

fair opportunity - I know he has been long  
talking about him, and has been anxious  
to see him - It will be a nice point to settle  
Mr Clark's business with Shungee, as he  
knows, he is a gun-smith - If Shungee  
will allow him to come as a schoolmaster  
and promise that he will not require
