

Monday 29. This morning we observed some large  
 canoes cross the Harbour - and in a little time  
 afterwards I was informed that Munghee had returned  
 from his Expedition - I was very glad to hear  
 this news, as it was apprehended he would be  
 angry if he had on his return found Mr Kendall gone -  
 I am in hopes I shall be able to convince him of  
 the necessity of Mr Kendall's removal, and also to  
 make some other arrangements with him for the  
 good of the mission - His mind was very much  
 against me on his return from England, in consequence  
 of my opposition to the missionaries supplying the natives  
 with muskets and powder - He had also been told that  
 I had written some against him, which made him  
 very angry - He has been expecting Mr Clark for some  
 time to make him guns - I have retained Mr Clark  
 in the colony of S. Wales until I have a full ex-  
 amination with Munghee relative to Mr Clark's employ-  
 ment should he come to New Zealand - If Munghee  
 is determined that he shall work as a gun Smith  
 Mr Clark must not come, if he will allow him  
 to come as a missionary he may then venture -  
 It is much to be lamented that Munghee is so fond of  
 war, and that from his few arrows he is so powerful  
 that no tribe in the Island can withstand his force -  
 Great slaughter has been made in this Expedition  
 of the inhabitants to the Southward - Munghee has  
 been absent about 3 months past long on the east side &  
 in the interior - Another party invested with Munghee  
 was carrying <sup>war</sup> on at the same time a war on the  
 west side, at a place called Terna-pot-tee  
 said to be very populous - <sup>about</sup> 200 miles or more from  
 the Bay of Islands - A man of high rank a relative  
 of Munghee's <sup>now</sup> has been killed in this
