 as well as from their extensive Influence which they

I am of an Opinion that a Mission sent out to New Zealand  
 under the Patronage of the established Church would rather  
 be considered as a part of the civil Government of N.S.  
 Wales, than as a separate Body; and have no doubt but  
 a Governor, whosoever he might be, would feel it his Duty  
 to afford the Missionaries every Protection and Support,  
 and more particularly so, as the British Government  
 seem well disposed towards the Natives of that Island.

Till the Society come to some Determination, to turn  
 their Attention to the above object, it would be unnecessary  
 to take into Consideration what would apparently be the  
 best mode to give Effect to the Mission, what Difficulties  
 are likely to oppose the work; and what would be the
