will cause one of your Servants to
see the enclosed letter delivered, or to
see if the person to whom it is directed
is living or dead, or if he has left
London or not. I have frequently

wrote to the person for whom the other
letter is, but could never get an
answer, his existence is a matter of the
greatest incongruence to me. as I intend
to go to Europe if he is a live, and enter
an Action for the Recovery of some
landed property which I have been
deprived of, my Counselor writes from
Dublin if I can procure this mans
evidence I will gain the property
in dispute. I have writ to him by
Sevoural and directed authors to
inquire and let me know the
result, but was all ways disceared
which is the cause of my thus intrusting
on your time by the advice of one
of your Missionaries in this part
and answer to the above inquiry
will confer a great Obligation
