I would observe that the Rev. R. Cartwright
 and Hall have not agreed well - Their Differ^{ence}
 took place before we embarked - I believe it
 originated principally from the new situation
 in which both of them were placed on board
 the Ship, without any solid foundation -

Excepting this little nonsense, we have been all
 very happy during the voyage, and I trust shall
 continue so - Mr. Cartwright is a very
 excellent man - and I have a very good opinion
 of Hall. I wish they had the same thoughts of
 each other, as I have of them both: they would
 not disagree - The Captain has behaved kind
 to us all - we have had a very healthy Ship
 and Service at sea twice on the Sabbath
