at that time 6^d p^o lb tho' this is charged as
property in my account yet I paid Sterling
Money for the same and could derive no
advantage from it had I wished so to do.
The Tobacco was also purchased by the Roll
In these transactions the Institution ran
no risk, suffered no loss nor the Workmen
injured but accommodated and obliged.
Having stated the above facts I feel myself
call'd on to mention another occurrence which
delicacy would have prevented me under
less painful circumstances - In the Year
1806 when I was about to return to England
I was directed by the late Governor King
to hand over the Orphan Accounts to Mr
Merchant Campbell who was appointed
Treasurer during my absence

At this time £255 Sterling was due
me as my p^o Centage which had been
ordered by the Governor to be paid the
Treasurer of the Orphan Institution for his
trouble. I declined receiving this sum at the
time tho' press'd by the Governor and
Committee so to do as they conceived it my
just right. Then the Governor and
Committee refused to receive from me my
p^o Centage as Treasurer, I purchased cattle
to that amount from Government and
presented them as a Donation to the
Female Orphan Institution which laid
the foundation of their now existing Herd
for the truth of this statement I beg to refer
you to the Rev^d Rich^d Hill the present
Secretary to the Orphan Institution
who has the whole of the Records of the
Institution
