visiting the Colony occasionally, is very great
and would be of considerable relief to them,
a man to remain here six or seven years
without seeing civil society requires more
than ordinary strength of mind, and an
abundance of the grace of God,

I must now return to Mr Kendall
who has strangely conducted himself lately,
since Shungee's return must conversation
has passed between them as is obvious
from Shungee's behaviour. after Mr K. had
been spending Sunday the 16th of Oct^r and part
of Monday under his roof - he has since
shewn his determination of not accom-
panying Mr Masden to the Colony - a
vessel has arrived and taken up by
Mr C. and Cap^t: Moore of the Brampton
to convey them to the Colony - His lan-
guage to Mr Masden has more than once
been most violent - and taking up the
idea - that the Society was bound to pay
his passage to England, and ration
him while here - and a few more reasonable
demands - which Mr C. told him he
would not be justified in acceding to
he told him he should bring his family
to Kildree Kildree - Shungee has given
him a piece of ground - a short distance
from the settlement - but I do not apprehend
any particular difficulties or inconvenience
from that - for it would be very much to the detri-
ment of Mr Kendall's present interests to leave the
place he is now at, which is just opposite to
one - two miles across the water - where all the
Whalers anchor - very convenient for his carrying
on any traffic he may think proper - should
